

- How funded: Organized by <u>NIPPA</u> (now The Early Years Organization) and the <u>World Forum Foundation</u>
- Who came: Early childhood leaders from organizations involved in reconciliation efforts in Northern Ireland, Croatia, Albania, Rwanda, Mali, South Africa, Israel, the Philippines, Nepal, Papua New Guinea, Colombia, and the United States
- From Conflict to Peace Building was written to capture some of the shared experiences.

#### What We Learned from the Book

The effects of conflict on children and their families can be very severe and longlasting

- Threats to physical and emotional safety
- Loss of homes & family members
- Disruption of routines
- Post-traumatic stress disorders
- Delays in social and cognitive development
- Violence becomes almost "normal"

### Impact on Social and Emotional Development

- Low self esteem
- Attachment issues
- Anxiety and insecurity
- Loss of language, identity, cultural integrity
- Arrests moral development
- Normalization of violence





# Strategies to Help

- Albania -- engaged elders & men in problem solving and planning
- Chad -- created child-friendly safe spaces
- Bosnia -- taught parents to run play sessions; model mutual respect
- Columbia -- developed strategies to modify violent imageries and negative behaviors; addressed psychosocial needs by scheduling therapy sessions for children and families.
- Palestine -- planned group activities that could relieve anxiety and stress -- art, music, etc.
- Nepal -- Children as a Zone of Peace

#### Media Initiative for Children

The Media Initiative for Children (MIFC) Respecting Difference programme, developed by Early Years and Pi - the Peace Initiatives Institute (USA), combines a series of cartoon messages with an early years programme. Together they aim to build a better understanding among children, parents, practitioners and teachers, of physical, social and cultural differences. The programme also addresses bullving behaviours. Building on the philosophy of partnership with parents, parental support is also provided through information sessions and workshops to groups and schools implementing the MIFC.

The development and launch of the Traveller cartoon message has been an exciting introduction to the programme this year. The creation of this message was funded by the Commissioner for Children Northern Ireland Office and aims to tackle the exclusion of Traveller children. Research has shown Traveller children to

be most at risk in the education system with ninety two percent of Travellers having no GCSEs.

The message introduced a new character, 'Kathleen' and supports young children in understanding what it feels like to be excluded. The accompanying resources and activities help children to learn more about the Traveller way of life as well as looking at the similarities all children have with each other.
